HB 2018 (SSB 5750) Summary: Requires a licensee, when a livestock inspection is required, to collect from the consignor and pay to the department of agriculture a per head inspection fee for each animal inspected or a time and mileage fee, whichever is greater. Increases fees for the following: (1) Inspection of cattle at a processing plant where the United States department of agriculture maintains a meat inspection program; (2) Issuance of an inspection certificate by the director; and (3) The time and mileage fee.
